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

- Malta as other post-industrial countries is experiencing a reconfiguration of the family and the domestic setting:
- Increasing low fertility
- Increasing life expectancy rates (Formosa, 2018)
 - Maltese population aged 65-plus reached 18.7% of the total population (NSO, 2019)

 - female-led single households, inter-generational households, shared professional households, solo living, living apart and blended families & LGBTQ families



Resilience as a tool for social cohesion and wellbeing?

The social dimension in urban planning and housing policies is often side-lined and the emphasis has been more on the importance of the built environment and its economic outcome (maximisation of space). Less attention has been granted to social relations and the key role they hold in determining the wellbeing of urban communities.
